11th Dungeness River Festival, September 24-26

The Dungeness River Festival began in the 1990s as a one-day event to celebrate our lovely watershed. The festival has now become a three-day event held every year during the last weekend in September. The festival occurs this year from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Friday through Sunday, September 24 to 26, in Railroad Bridge Park. As an extra added treat, on Friday evening the NW Raptor Center will present *Birds of Prey* in the Sequim High School cafeteria. Come one, come all!

Last year's attendance at the Festival reached nearly 3,000, including over 800 students. We need many volunteers during the festival, so Gretha Davis (681-8013) and Julie Jackson (683-1355) would like to recruit your help. If you're available to help with set-up on Thursday afternoon (Sept. 23) or with other projects during the Festival itself (Sept. 24-26), please contact them ASAP.

Exhibits on Friday and Saturday include nearly all the local, state, federal, tribal and non-profit agencies and non-profits active in the Dungeness watershed. The Festival is open to the public every day, with a special education day on Friday geared to the hundreds of students attending that day. Each exhibitor has been asked to provide an educational activity related to nature and the environment. Students will even provide the music: The Five Acres School marimba band, *Sound Waves*, will be performing.

In addition to nature exhibits and activities for all ages, the Festival features music, dancing, walks, story telling, arts, crafts, food, and more. Highlights this year will include a Community Drumming Circle (Sat., 1 p.m.) and the Olympic Driftwood Sculptors second anniversary show. Popular local musicians include Kentucky Bullfrog (Sat, 11:00), Cort Armstrong (Sun. 11:00), and Mike Kamphaus, one-man band & musical show, *Me, Myself, and I* (Sun., 1:00). Director's Notes

Congratulations to Penny Burdick for winning the "Your Dungeness River" contest run by the River Center in the Sequim Gazette on August 11 and 18. Support for the contest and the entire program came from a TogetherGreen Innovation Grant from Toyota and National Audubon. Penny answered two questions correctly: 1) Name the species and stocks of salmonid fish in the Dungeness River and describe their status on the endangered species list, and 2) Name three ways that local residents can help protect the Dungeness River, its riparian forests, and its fish and wildlife. As Penny said, "The answers were all on the signs on the bridge." Thanks to everyone for reading the interpretive signs and particularly to the people who entered our contest.

The River Center received a wonderful donation in August: a perfect scale model of Railroad Bridge, constructed by Bill Rice and donated on behalf of the North Olympic Railroaders. Bill is 87 years old, a wonderful gentleman with lots of good stories. Bill constructed the bridge over 1800 hours, including many hours of research and photos to make sure the model was authentic. The model is 1/4-inch scale, which means that one-quarter inch on the model equals one foot on the real bridge. Particularly interesting is that Bill's model shows the bridge as it was built in 1915, not as it is today, so the end supports are made out of wood rather than concrete and metal. We will prepare a special shelf and display for Bill's model, where it will help inform the public about the past railroad history of the north Olympic Peninsula.

It has been another busy summer at the River Center, with summer camps, Art in the Park, community festivals, bird and river classes, and the ever-increasing tourist traffic through the Center and Park. Many, many thanks to our community outreach committee, particularly Julie Jackson, Gretha Davis, Lyn Muench, and Shirley Anderson, who work many hours behind the scenes helping to plan and carry out our events. Keep checking our website, www.DungenessRiverCenter.org, to stay abreast of our upcoming events and the latest news of the river and park.

Water volumes in the Dungeness River have been very high this summer, largely because the cool spring weather earlier this year slowed down snowmelt in the Olympics. The river flows this summer have been higher than any year since 1999, which set a record for river volume in July and August. Everyone hopes the high water promises good salmon spawning this fall. The first Chinook salmon redds of the summer have been located in the river, so keep checking in RR Bridge Park for spawning salmon now through the end of the year.

I was recently reminded that Bob Boekelheide has the gift of gab. He can walk past a fragment of lichen, stoop, pick it up and pique anyone's curiosity with an immediate question that is likely to start: "Did you know...?" I cannot begin to gab as freely but I have begun to notice things the way Bob does. Really. It is autumn now and of course we think of the deciduous leaves turning color and falling and the students with their bulging backpacks standing at the corner. It seems apt to share one of my favorite self-assignments: Go outside (of course) and pay attention to small details that would otherwise go unnoticed. Describe what you see (a journal or sketch pad brings an immediate 4.0) and then ask some slightly inane questions. Maybe you want to know if all the Big Leaf Maple leaves are changing color simultaneously. Maybe you wonder if the river water is carrying silt. Maybe you need to find out if all the Thimbleberries have the same sweet-tart flavor. My favorite is when I notice something that I cannot explain. That's when we get to call Bob or Powell!

Planned Giving Options ~ by Sue Chickman

You recently received the Dungeness River Audubon Center's (RC) new endowment brochure. The brochure highlights our vision to provide high-quality environmental education and stewardship programs for future generations. Our goal is to raise an endowment fund of \$5 million that will sustain the RC and Railroad Bridge Park for many years to come. Please help us reach that goal.

The endowment brochure lists some planned giving options available to you, should you decide to include the River Center in your estate planning. The Endowment Committee has met with local legal and financial professionals who have helped us with gifting options. Sequim attorney Erwin P. Jones, Jr., P.S., has helped with the following three types:

Wills: This type of gift generally requires tax considerations and legal language, so obtain professional assistance when writing your will. You can name a specific dollar amount, item (real property, stock certificate, car, etc.), or designate a percentage of the residuary estate value.

Codicils: If your existing will is complex, voluminous, and was expensive to create, adding a codicil is a good idea. If your existing will is simple, it may actually be less expensive to create a new one, particularly if you are still in contact with the attorney who wrote the existing will. In Washington, the codicil must be executed with the same formality as the original will. There are requirements, which, if not observed, will invalidate a codicil or a will.

Living Trusts: An individual (Trustor) may create a "Trust" (a fund controlled by a third person) **by will** (Testamentary Trust), or **during his or her life** (Living Trust). The choice is dependent on conditions and circumstances unrelated to the decision to make a gift to the River Center. There are advantages and disadvantages to both. If you already have a Trust, then an amendment can be added (similar to adding a codicil to a will). Although a knowledgeable Trustor can do this, most people will want to seek counsel. The Living Trust needs to be distinguished from several other tax advantaged charitable trusts, which definitely require legal and tax planning assistance.

You can also donate your automobile to the River Center! Do you have a good running extra car you don't need anymore, or do you want to lessen your environmental footprint? As a community service, Wilder Toyota will purchase RC-approved autos, with the proceeds going to the River Center Endowment and the donation tax benefit going to the donor of the auto.
