2020: An Unprecedented Year of Change and Growth

Plans change, willows planted on river's bank, and teams "Rally" to fund River Center education

Planning for the River Center's 2020 year of speakers, programming, field trips, and events was well underway when the pandemic hit in January last year.

At first it seemed that ordinary precautions could be taken with bleach, wipes to sanitize surfaces, and boxes of gloves and masks. But in March, the state forced closure of most public facilities. The staff took their laptops home to work. And parallel plans had to be made for both short- and long-term closures. Who knew?

In the meantime, 500 willow twigs, which had been purchased for grade-school children to plant during their spring field trips, were instead put in the ground by director Powell Jones, educational coordinator, Jenna Ziogas, and volunteers, after field trips were canceled. Salmon, raised from eggs hatched in the River Center's aquarium for kids to release into the river, were released right on time by staff.

Because so many of its walk-a-thonstyled teams are engaged in solitary pursuits, the River Center Rally did get underway in March with 9 teams finding sponsors. They continued to bike, ride, hike, pull scotch broom, and make pledges to accomplish other tasks, to raise money through June.

BirdFest grounded, programs soar on Zoom, children stay home

In April, as the state see-sawed between possible openings and continued closures, BirdFest, an annual three-day event with dozens of field trips on the North Olympic Peninsula, was finally canceled, and fees were refunded. BirdFest sponsored by Olympic Peninsula Audubon is one of the primary funding sources for the River Center's educational programming.

By May it was clear that closures would be extensive. Not willing to be defeated, the River Center moved all of its programming to Zoom, and began sending weekly emails about the wonders of nature on the Olympic Peninsula to over 3,000 people on the mailing list. The silver lining in this cloud was both an impressive jump in attendance and in people reading, and responding to emails. Surprised by the success on Zoom, all programming was offered on Zoom for the rest of the year, free of charge.

Summer camps for kids, however, had to be canceled, a disappointment for participants, staff and volunteers.

Building expansion begins with a S'Klallam blessing; adjacent field graded, a new entry and road carved out

By July, all permits had been approved and the expansion of the River Center began with a ground- breaking ceremony via Zoom. Jamestown S'Klallam Tribal Council Vice-Chair Loni Greninger sang a blessing in the S'Klallam language; Jamestown S'Klallam Tribal Council Chair/CEO W. Ron Allen spoke, as did River Center founder Annette Hanson, about creating this building for the community, and for future generations. (The ground-breaking is recorded and available if you would like to see it.)

In October, construction began on the expansion, closing down the Center for the rest of 2020, and into 2021. To accommodate the new building, the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe had purchased the field east of the River Center, as well as property to access it from Hendrickson Road. With the Tribe acting as General Contractor of the job, excavation began with a new access road and leveling the field for both a new parking lot, and the building site. (You can follow the progress of this project on the River Center's website where it has been

posted every week since construction began in October!

Closure for construction continued to coincide with closures for the pandemic through the end of the year. Consequently, Dine on the Dungeness, a dinner party on the deck of the historic railroad bridge crossing the Dungeness River, was canceled... as was RiverFest, an event in Railroad Bridge Park established in the 1990's to teach young students about the Dungeness Watershed and its flora and fauna, and their importance to celebrate and protect it. Further, to introduce children to those working for National Parks, State Parks, the Forest Service, in fish restoration projects, and other nature-related jobs.


Outdoor restrictions began to relax midsummer but required both social distancing and masking. At the end of July, The River Center Charity Golf Tournament was held at the Cedars at Dungeness. The "virtual tournament" extended over three days, and was socially distanced for safety, with meal vouchers given to each golfer in lieu of a luncheon.

The remainder of 2020 was relatively quiet, except for the sound of heavy equipment, and the daily salute of nail guns that rang out the old year.

But the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe, undeterred, brought light to the bridge to brighten up one of the darkest winters we've ever collectively experienced. Over 20,000 people came to see the hundreds of shimmering colored lights intertwined with swags of holly, and cedar that ran the length of the bridge. We needed that!



2020 Financial Summary



*Operating Income does not include the restricted Capital Campaign donations or grants.

The Center's Legacy Fund is used to supplement cash needs of operations. An \$80,000 withdrawal was made in 2020 and a \$78,000 withdrawal was made in 2019 for anticipated operation's shortfalls during the construction transition.

The Legacy Fund balance as of December 31, 2020, was \$2,002,729 compared to \$1,877,834 at the end of 2019.




